

Principal

he college preparatory experience that Palma provides to young men is second to none. In an environment where 35 Honors and Advanced Placement courses are offered: 22 students have been recognized by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation over the last six years alone; 48 Palma seniors have graduated with the distinction of "AP Scholar", scoring a passage rate of at least a "3" or better on three or more Advanced Placement (AP) Exams since 2010; and 16 California Boys' State Delegates to Sacramento over the last six summers. With an award winning music and arts program, a thriving athletic program, and an increasingly richer variety of extracurricular clubs and activities, Palma is matriculating students to some of the best universities in the country.

I am most proud, however, of Palma's purposeful approach to sewing the seeds of spiritual growth among a diverse body of students during their high school experiences here. Palma's student service requirement is rooted in the Christian Brother tradition. Students meet and, in many cases, greatly exceed the 60-hour minimum service requirement. Palma's Campus Ministry and the Brother Edmund Rice Society have partnered over the years to create a plethora of opportunities for students to experience service locally and internationally, and this experience is enhanced by multiple components for reflection inspiring transformation for the server and the served alike. Many institutions call upon Palma students to assist with parish and community events, to assist with the aggregation and delivery of food to local agencies and even to various folks' front doors, to help the city's homeless, and the elderly / lonely being cared for in local retirement communities. Students also serve weekly at the Center for Life in East Salinas, tutoring and mentoring students in a gang stressed neighborhood. The community raves about the quality of Palma students' service.

The Essential Elements of an Edmund Rice Christian Brothers Education call us to "educate and advocate for peace, justice, global awareness, and care for the earth," and to "stand in solidarity with those marginalized by poverty and injustice". Under the leadership of Palma's dynamic Director of Campus Ministry, with terrific support from Palma faculty and staff, student retreats are more directly grounded in a service-based

foundation as a focus from which students can experience learning and reflection in a more meaningful way. Whereas most retreats are planned so as to create quiet time and space for introspection and prayer, Palma student retreats begin with the challenge for young men to get busy serving with their hands in order to ready their hearts for true meaning and engagement created by the fruit of their labor. This is the kind of learning that goes way beyond the confines of a classroom. Such service is authentic and even uncomfortable at times, and it often empowers students to bond in communion with one another, in solidarity with those less fortunate, and with God. Go Chieftains!


Jon Christensen

BALANCE

fter 30 years in the army Jon Christensen decided he wasn't ready to retire fully. After living throughout the country and abroad, including a stint teaching at West Point in New York, he and his wife Teresa agreed when it was time to retire, Monterey was where they wanted to be. Both California natives, with families in Sacramento, Christensen also taught at the Navel Post Graduate School during his tenure in the military. Upon retirement, Palma was a natural fit.

Christensen compares much of what he learned in the military of duty, honor and country to Palma's ISOs. The Palma ISOs are based on The Essential Elements of an Edmund Rice Christian Brother Education. Guided by this philosophy, Palma educates young men who take responsibility for:

Spiritual / Moral: living as individuals with a strong foundation in Christian values and beliefs. Intellectual: demonstrating an appreciation for learning in a changing world by thinking and acting critically, independently, creatively and collaboratively. Physical: developing the knowledge to make healthful choices, to maximize skills for lifelong enjoyment of physical activity, and to master sportsmanship. Social: interacting with others effectively and in a manner that reflects the Christian values of respect, compassion, and service.



"Palma has set up their students for success because of the ISOs" Christensen states. These are not part of other high schools that he has seen. He ran track, wrestled and played football while in high school himself and has a different appreciation for the students who balance all of their extra curricular activities as well as studies that make up his classroom at Palma. He runs after school and believes that teachers should set a good example both in and out of the classroom. "At 52 I still enjoy running and keeping fit. Mental, physical and spiritual, if those are in balance then your life will be balanced.

When talking about motivating his students, Christensen says that "Everyone has the potential to get an A, and with positive reinforcement students are able to realize their potential." Because of his years in the military, he has taken that knowledge and transferred it to the classroom. "In the military, life was all about solving a problem. And that is how I have set up my classroom. In life, my students would not be asked to integrate an equation but they will be asked to problem solve; meaning they need to


wade through meaningful information and create a simple solution."

When asked what he would like his students to remember about him after they have moved on, he says, "Hopefully, that I have made them curious and a lifelong learner which is a habit as well. I hope my students know how to self motivate, and get up everyday and learn something."

When visiting one of Christensen's AP Statistics, AP Calculus, AP BC Calculus or Honors or standard Geometry classes one would see an interactive and involved classroom. Students assimilate situations by breaking down problems into pieces with methodology. The thought process and discipline are what gets students to the next step. With a mixture of lecture and in class problems and labs to keep students motivated and interested, with visual models in 3-D and good software, students are able to interact with the classroom materials.

Although incredibly busy with a full schedule of classes, Mr. Christensen remains well rounded and balanced just like his students at Palma.

or Christopher O'Brien, first-year teacher at Palma High School in Salinas, it wasn't rocket science that led him into teaching, though it could have been.

O'Brien, 24, is the new physics/pre-calculus instructor at Palma. He holds a bachelor's degree in physics and a master's in education — both from Stanford University. He is credentialed to teach physics and mathematics.

At Stanford, he worked as a research assistant in the university's radiation oncology department where he helped develop a new method for molecular imaging during electron radiation therapy.

But it was more a matter of the heart and soul that fueled his passion for teaching.

O'Brien sat in his classroom situated at the rear of the Palma campus and shared that "ah ha" moment. While at Stanford, he interned one summer at the Bay Area Urban Project, a drug and alcohol recovery center in Oakland. He was tutoring a guy about his own age, he said, who was studying for the GED exam. They became close. The young man passed the GED.

That experience helped O'Brien realize the value of teaching, his gift for it and how much of a difference he could make in the lives of others.

"I realized that I like to help people ... and I was good at explaining things," he said.

O'Brien is in his second year of teaching. Last year he taught freshman physics at a parochial high school in his home state, New Jersey.

He said he returned to the West Coast to marry his wife, Sarah. They met at Stanford as students and now reside in Santa Cruz. She works for a Christian fellowship program based at UC Santa Cruz.

He commutes to Salinas daily; a Palma student catches a ride with him.

As for his practical teaching skills, such as classroom management, O'Brien said physics and pre-calculus tend to attract motivated students. He doesn't have to deal with class clowns or behavioral distractions.

"The most challenging thing about teaching is the amount of energy and time it takes to prepare for a good class," he said. "I could always use more time to prepare in order to improve something, but have to do the best I can with the time I have."

O'Brien also is a fellow of the Knowles Science Teaching Foundation. The fellowship is a five-year commitment to support new teachers in the STEM subjects - science, technology, engineering and math.

Jeffrey J. Rozelle, director of the Knowles Teaching Fellows Program, said the foundation's mission is to find the top teachers entering the profession and support them for the rest of their careers.

"Our hope is that we are drawing from the best new math and science teachers in country," he said.

In the first five years, fellows are given an annual stipend and can apply for more funding for their classroom equipment and supplies. The fellows also can pursue professional development at Knowles' expense. Each class of fellows - O'Brien is among 31 other teachers selected in 2014 - meets three times a year and join an online network to stay in touch and share teaching experiences, Rozelle said.

After five years, the teachers become senior fellows for the rest of their careers, if they choose, Rozelle said.

The program reflects our belief that mentoring and supporting new teachers helps them develop into leaders," he said.

Such support can make a difference in an area of teaching in which about half of the math and science instructors bail out of the profession after five years, Rozelle said.

Founded in 1999, there are 250 Knowles fellows across nation: 150 new and 100 senior fellows.

Rozelle, who sits on the selection committee, said among the qualities that impressed them about O'Brien was his commitment to teaching.

O'Brien wrote in an email: "I would say the most rewarding thing about teaching for me is forming relationships with students and helping them to grow in all areas of life."

"The most rewarding thing about teaching physics is helping students understand how the world around them works. It's exciting when students have an "ah-ha" moment and something clicks."

"Teaching is a profession in which I can teach a subject I love, form meaningful relationships, and positively impact students in all areas of their lives," O'Brien said.


Friends are gathered here today, just a bit more than a year from the sudden loss of Steve Clayton, to keep Steve's memory alive and to also honor him for touching us as we hadn't been touched before. Steve Clayton's role as a key member of the Palma family was always in the spotlight and was meant to be that way from our first meeting. Steve's dedication to his teaching, to his coaching, to his running a high-profile athletic program was remarkable; his word was good and his reputation impeccable. There was never any doubt but that he wore his Red and Gold well and with great pride in promoting academics and athletics as the key pairing he knew them to be here at Palma, in that order: academics and athletics. While the Palma colors ran deep from within, Steve was color-blind when it came to students on this campus and beyond - it was all for the kids - Palma kids as well as those competing with and against Palma. Steve had the gift of insight and could see the larger picture that escapes so many.

None of us had the opportunity to say our goodbyes nor the chance to thank Steve for his many contributions to the Palma cause and beyond. Death often comes like a thief in the night - none of us saw Steve not being here, not being available, not hosting an awards program on that fateful Sunday fifth-three weeks ago. Is he missed? He certainly is. And that is the challenge and reality those left behind have to deal with, day in, day out. I know Steve well enough to know that he would want all of us to take what he had established and find a way to take it to the next level, to build on it. I also know Steve was proud of what he had built and formed and cajoled while here at Palma.

Steve Clayton was a man of many talents and gifts. He was the cause for many exceptional things to happen on his watch as Palma teacher, coach, and athletic director. Palma Student Places 1st in Monterey County Journalist Mock Trial

Palma student, Kevin Bass. earned 1st Place for courtroom journalism in the 2015 Mock Trial Competition of the Lyceum of Monterey County. The finals were hosted on Saturday, February 7, 2015. Kevin competed at the California State competition in Riverside March 20-22 representing Palma School and competed against 22 journalist that were a part of their mock trial competition teams representing 33 counties and 34 schools. Here is the article he submitted that placed him above the rest of the competition in Monterey County.

Grad Student Found Guilty in Treason Theft

MONTEREY— In front of a packed gallery at the Monterey County Courthouse on Monday evening, Evan Shem was found guilty of stealing the painting Treason. Shem stole the painting from Marty McCulloch, Shem's former art history professor at Hamiltonia University where she is currently a graduate student. "Ms. Shem had decided that you can put a price on trust," according to Alexander Serrano for the prosecution.

The painting was stolen from McCulloch last summer during his annual Fourth of July party at his mansion in Hamiltonia. Shem, an intern to McCulloch, acted as a docent and showed some 200 guests the art gallery. The next day McCulloch discovered the painting to be a fake, and called the police.

Both the prosecution and the defense called their own expert witnesses, but oddly they offered completely contradictory opinions. Expert witness for the prosecution, Bernie Worcester, used the method of connoisseurship to determine that the painting found in Shem's apartment was in fact the original Treason.

However, the defense called Jamie Sardegna to the stand to claim that in her expert opinion the authentic Treason was still hanging in McCulloch's mansion, and that no crime had been committed. Like Worcester, Sardegna used the method of connoisseurship and yet the two experts came to exactly opposite conclusions.

During closing arguments defense attorney Noah Thanos asked "does a lack of evidence mean an inside job, or a crime that only occurred in McCulloch's mind?"

When asked about which expert he believed, Judge Mark Hood said he was "persuaded by the combination of the prosecution's witness and the owner's, [Mc-Culloch's], opinion."

McCulloch was given the painting by his deceased father Edward McCulloch, who left him as the heir to a railroad fortune. Although other paintings in McCulloch's gallery were as valuable as three million dollars, Treason was appraised at just \$100,000. An extremely emotional McCulloch called it "merely a family heirloom that means very much to me; and Ms. Shem apparently."

In addition to the argument that the painting was never stolen, the defense tried to imply that Shem's roommate Charlie Gibbons stole the painting and replaced it with one of many replicas Shem admitted to making.

Gibbons was seen leaving a hallway attached to the gallery the night of the party, giving him the opportunity to take Treason. The defense however was unable to provide a motive for his stealing the painting.

When asked about the most convincing piece of evidence, Judge Hood said that he was sure of Shem's guilt because of his "having motive and opportunity to steal the item." Judge Hood decided the verdict as this was a bench trial, meaning there was no jury.

Before the trial, a defense motion to suppress evidence obtained during an unlawful search was granted. It was ruled that Detective Reese Barron was not acting in good faith when he searched Shem's carport on July 7.

No date has been set for sentencing.























Tacky Ball



He also had the opportunity to pair with eight-time PGA Tour winner Champion pro Brad Faxon Jr. in the Coca-Cola Champions Challenge, which kicked off the First Tee Open golf tournament at Pebble Beach Golf Links.

Abadilla was one of eighty-one participants representing 56 chapters of The First Tee that were selected to play in the Nature Valley First Tee Open at Pebble Beach, an official Champions Tour event hosted by Monterey Peninsula Foundation. The event was held September 26-28 and televised internationally on Golf Channel.







WE WERE SADDENED to learn of the recent passing of long-time Palma teacher Roger D. Connor.

Roger's Palma career ran for eighteen years, starting in the fall of 1990. He spent the bulk of his Palma time working with the seniors, teaching government and economics. He was not bashful about giving his advice to each and every senior as well as having opinions on each and every senior and their response to his advice to them; there was never a dull moment while Roger worked with the seniors. He also was charged with giving direction to student activities for all six grade levels; he was the senior class advisor and also served as chairman of the social studies department. In 2006 he transitioned his talents and skills into a new position for himself and Palma, that of director of admissions; he served in that role for two years and gave notice that he would be completing his Palma career in June of 2008 in order to spend time with his ailing wife.

Known as a gourmet cook, Roger shared his talents and gifts with others beyond the classroom. He was generous with his time and talents and would often be observed doing something that was well beyond what was required or expected.
